NAIDOC Week at WHOS Rozelle

The theme for NAIDOC week 2018 was 'Because of her, we can' which honours the role of women in the community and at local, state and national levels.

WHOS Rozelle celebrated NAIDOC by inviting residents and staff to submit creative media for an exhibition displayed in the medical area for the week. Submissions included art, poetry, multi media installations connected to the NAIDOC theme this year.

The week long exhibition was celebrated with a closing event on the Friday with guest speaker, Susan Moylan Coombs, founding Director of The Gaimaragal Group and part of the Stolen Generations group, who spoke on the power of sharing and creating new stories of connection and wellbeing for Indigenous and non Indigenous Australians. NAIDOC week was a milestone for WHOS as we also welcomed its first two First Nations employees Chris Duckett, WHOS Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Engagement Worker and Calley Clarke, Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander Consumer Liaison Worker, who will work with Australia's First Nations peoples in the WHOS therapeutic community - all are pictured below with Jen Grindell, WHOS Corporate Services Manager.

Our Indigenous clients from the Yarning Circle lunch group performed with poetry reading, dancing and singing, followed by an afternoon tea. This event was supported by WHOS Reconciliations Action Group.



The Big Anxiety: A festival of arts + science + people

In anticipation of The Big Anxiety Festival being held in Callan Park next year, WHOS Rozelle hosted some of the Callan Park tenants so the organisers could brief them on what the festival aims to achieve and how different organisations could potentially participate. The Festival has the support of the Inner West Council and is the first international biennial arts festival devoted to mental health, uniquely combining ground-breaking research, art and community engagement.

Running throughout mental health month (October), the Festival encompasses visual arts, multimedia and immersive environments, social engagement projects, literary and film competitions, performances, discussion forums, and more. Thai Delegation of Senior Officials

WHOS was proud again to receive a very senior delegation of officials from Thailand.

The Thai delegation was led by the Deputy Prime Minister of Thailand and included senior Ministers, the Secretary General of the Thailand Office of Narcotics Control Board, senior Health Department officials, Foreign Affairs officials and officers from the Thai Embassy in Australia.

WHOS was the only NGO service to be visited by the service and was a result of the special request of the delegation to visit WHOS because of our strong links with the Thanyarak Hospital system in Thailand and their delivery of residential rehabilitation programs.

The delegation toured the facilities at Rozelle, met with staff and residents and thanked WHOS for our continued support of Thai organisations and staff - some of whom receive training at WHOS.







New House for WHOS Najara – Sunshine Coast

More Sunshine Coast women suffering alcohol and drug addiction will have access to a rehab bed thanks to Federal funding to build a new transitional home.

Member for Fairfax Ted O'Brien said \$256,060 awarded under the Building Better Regions Fund (BBRF) would help pay for a women's only six-bedroom rehabilitation building in the Nambour area.

The project will enable WHOS to support female clients in their recovery from drug and alcohol dependence and regaining their lives.

The project is one of 136 in Australia funded under the \$200million BBRF Infrastructure Projects stream.

Mr O'Brien joined WHOS Executive Director Garth Popple and Manager of the Nambour residential therapeutic community, Trevor Hallewell, for a soil-turning ceremony at WHOS' Najara Nambour Service.

The new six-bedroom home with designated dining and living areas for group work and relaxation activities will be built on WHOS' existing Najara property which currently has capacity for 20 clients at a time.

Mr O'Brien said the new transitional home would enable up to 40 additional people each year to access the live-in service, a 20 per cent increase on current admissions.

"There is a huge need in the community for residential-style rehab centres like this which is evidenced in the fact that only 15.7 per cent of people inquiring are currently able to access a bed," said Mr O'Brien.

"This facility will hopefully make a difference to the lives of more women and their families as they struggle with addictions and the associated problems of crime, homelessness and unemployment.

"Clients will share cleaning, cooking, gardening as they would in their own home and will establish new routines in their lives.

"It's about helping them develop a sense of responsibility and learning to contribute back to their transitional house community."

WHOS Executive Director Garth Popple said without the chance at rehabilitation, people could end up in prison, homeless or dead.

"We have huge demands for beds and timing is so important. It's vital that someone is able to get a bed when they need it," said Mr Popple.

"The average stay at one of our facilities is about 90 days and our therapeutic community care model is highly effective, reducing illicit drug and alcohol use to zero.

"The severity of dependence is also reduced by 47 per cent and people experience improved psychological health and quality of life."

Established in 1972, Mr Popple said WHOS operated more than 260 beds nationally, supporting more than 800 alcohol and drug affected individuals each year.



Rozelle Kitchen & Cafe Revamp

Recently, the WHOS Kitchen & Community Cafe underwent a revamp. The kitchen serves meal to over 150 people every day and is an integral part of the vocational and employment pathways program at WHOS. Visitors are always impressed with the quality of the food prepared and served by WHOS residents so keeping up appearances that match this quality is important.

Our thanks to all the residents and staff that helped in this important kitchen and cafe improvement.



Indonesian National Narcotics Board (BNN) Visit to WHOS Rozelle

Recently WHOS hosted a delegation of senior Indonesian officials from the National Narcotics Board (BNN) who had requested a visit to WHOS so as to provide them with a greater understanding of residential drug and alcohol treatment services. The BNN runs a number of residential services across Indonesia and are very interested in redeveloping their current models of treatment in these services. It is expected that follow-up visits will happen next year, including potential assistance from WHOS to develop more effective and evidence based services in Indonesia.





Client Stories

I was at a homeless shelter, when a former WHOS client who worked there as staff simply said, "You deserve better than this." He had met me ten years before when I was drug free and in recovery. This comment triggered the desire in me to get 'drug free' via the WHOS OST reduction program at WHOS OSTAR, that both of us knew worked.

I was living in complete dereliction in Redfern; homelessness, hopelessness and despair were my daily struggles. As a young boy, I had dreams of how my life would turn out. Instead, it became the opposite. I lived in fear, and my body was wracked with leg, back and ankle injuries from violent encounters, and my methadone prescribers increasing my dose to 130mg in response to these things. The highlights of my week would be Monday and Friday mornings; these were the days the chemist would give me take away doses, and I would greedily inject them into myself.

Today I have reached my goal of reaching drug free from my OST, I weigh 80kgs (I was 66kg on arrival at WHOS OSTAR), and have self-esteem and a sense of well being. I care about other people, and they in turn have genuine concern for me. I have an external recovery sponsor (mentor), and I talk honestly when asked to share my story at Aftercare meetings. I have contact with my brother and am looking forward to seeing my niece act in a play soon. Both my mum and dad are happy to hear my voice when I call, and I have a newfound confidence.

The prospect of rehab at my age (I'm 55 yrs) was daunting. I initially felt challenged to do the full program while I was reducing off methadone. I questioned my chances at dealing with all the rules and responsibilities and what I then regarded as lack of freedom.

The upside is the routine, all the services at my disposal, the Centrelink Liaison Officer, Nursing staff, local doctors, Family Support workers, and I am now about to get weekly counselling with a visiting psychologist. I have gained much confidence in three months, which has been instilled in me via house (i.e. rehab) job function responsibilities – from cleaning our own bathrooms through to a senior role known as rehab house director (responsible for assisting staff with the day to day operations of the service), Aftercare meetings and companionship. I now have quality problems.

My goal now is to complete my Certificate IV in youth work; I had previously completed my first semester. I would love to work with medium-to-high-needs teenagers and role model to them by being a principled man in recovery. I also want to be an integral part of my family's lives, and be happy, kind and generous.

Excellence in Research and Evaluation Award

WHOs was recently awarded a Certificate of Commendation for its Cognitive Remediation Project at the third biennial AOD Awards for the NSW Non Government Sector. This Excellence in Research and Evaluation award category recognises individuals or organisations that have contributed to building the evidence base for practices to reduce alcohol and other drugs related harms.

The awards were presented as part of the NADA Conference dinner on 8 June 2018 and was accepted by WHOS Nursing Unit Manager - Carolyn Stubley.
