2016 National Family Drug Support Day

WHOS was pleased to be a sponsor and supporter of the inaugural National Family Drug Support Day on the 24th February. Simultaneous events were held in Parliament Houses across the country with many Ministers and members of Parliament attending. Garth Popple, Executive Director of WHOS (pictured with FDS CEO Tony Trimingham) represented both WHOS and the Australasian Therapeutic Communities Association Chairperson at the major event in Parliament House Canberra and gave an impassioned speech on the benefits of treatment and working with families of people in treatment.

When clinicians, politicians and media talk about drug and alcohol issues affecting our communities they often raise the importance of assisting, supporting and engaging more with families. Unfortunately for many families the reality is much different. As we know, behind every statistic of a drug related overdose death, arrest or hospitalisation there is a family suffering the pain. All too often in a cloud of stigma and shame.

The first National Family Drug Support Day which was held on the anniversary of the passing of Damien Trimingham from a drug related overdose will now become an annual event to highlight the need for families to not only be recognised and heard but to be supported and encouraged to speak about their concerns and their needs.

Thai delegation

Recently we saw the arrival of 4 staff from the Thai Addictions Hospital system in Thailand for a 12 week training program in therapeutic community programs. The visit was sponsored by the Thai Government to provide senior staff from their residential rehabilitation centres across Thailand to be trained in the therapeutic community model utilised by WHOS.

As part of what we believe is an ongoing obligation in our Asia Pacific Region, WHOS provided this training to assist the Thai Government Hospital staff in experiencing contemporary therapeutic community models of care used in Australia and potential models of care for its hospitals which have a combined total of over 1,500 beds providing residential rehabilitation for people with drug and alcohol problems.

The transition to a therapeutic community model is not an easy process but their senior executive staff, with the support of the Thai Government, requested WHOS to assist and support them in this task. This was a request that WHOS was honoured to receive, and subsequently provided a tailored training program for the delegation.

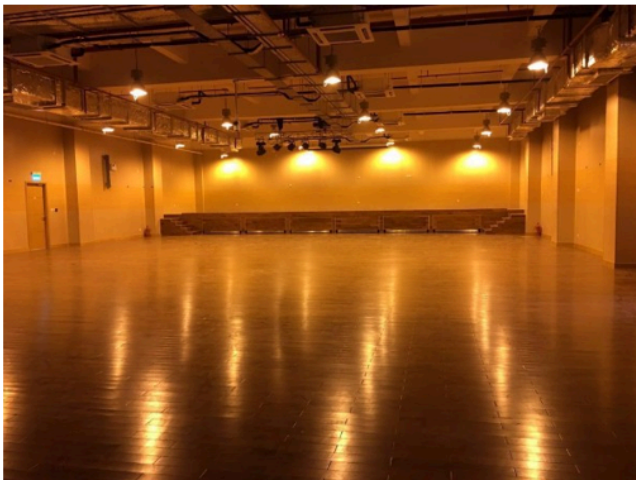
The Executive Director of WHOS, Garth Popple, was grateful to his staff across all WHOS centres for working so hard to ensure that the Thai delegation received the best training and assistance possible. This included a period of time for the Thai staff trainees as 'temporary residents' in the WHOS Sunshine Coast facility, to understand the perspective of clients (lived experience). Fellow residents at the site were also treated to a Thai food feast one night.



Macau delegation

In 2016, WHOS hosted senior staff from a Macau service that operates therapeutic communities, outreach programs, needle and syringe programs as well as youth outreach and drop-in services in Macau. The senior staff all work in the therapeutic centres and are training at WHOS as part of an ongoing collaborative program between our two organisations to prepare for the opening of a brand new purpose built therapeutic community centre in Macau by the Macau Administration.

There were some pre-training sessions held in Macau and the Macau staff that attended in Australia have



been provided with training in the therapeutic community model at WHOS with a view to implementing a similar program in the new centre in Macau (see photos). This new centre is expected to open later in 2016 and will have 70 beds in total for both men and women.

WHOS will also be providing ongoing support and training over this important establishment period for the newest therapeutic community in the Asia Pacific Region.



Value Your Mind

WHOS recently participated in the Mental Health Commission of NSW Living Well: Value Your Mind event at NSW Parliament House. As a leading organisation delivering co-morbidity services for people with alcohol and other drug issues, WHOS was pleased to be joined with the many community organisations that also deliver essential community mental health services. Awards

WHOS is proud to announce that it has received a number of awards in recent months.

Our New Beginnings Program received an award for a Significant Contribution to the Therapeutic Community Movement in Australasia for its demonstrated history of utilising and building best practice for women specific AOD work. The award was presented by Peter Kennerley from the New Zealand Ministry of Health (see WHOS Manager Sarah Etter and staff pictured)

In addition, our WHOS Harm Reduction Program received a Certificate of Commendation for Excellence in Health Promotion at the 2016 the Network of Alcohol and other Drug Agencies (NADA) Awards which was presented by the NSW Minister for Mental Health, the Hon Pru Goward (pictured with WHOS Nurse Manager Carolyn Stuble).

Mr Garth Popple was also very honoured to be one of only a handful of people to ever be presented with a Mentorship Award in Thailand. The award was presented by a member of the King of Thailand's Privy Council in front of over 1,500 people in Bangkok in June.



As part of WHOS commitment to improving the information flow in the AOD and related sectors, we were pleased in mid-2015 to introduce our new Daily Media Service. This is a valuable and free service which was previously provided by other organisations and which many in the sector felt was a real loss for them when the service ceased.
